
Popular Scams

- Overpaid check
- Pay a fee to get a prize/loan/grant
- Friend in distress (grandparent scam)
- Tech support scam
- Friendship/romance scam
- I know what you did (extortion)





Fraud and Identity Theft





What NOT to give to fraudsters

1. Money

Via your bank, credit card, gift cards, Western Union

2. Account information

Leads to your money

3. Personal information

Leads to your accounts





Top Scams of 2020

1. Fraudulent merchandise

Goods that are misrepresented or never delivered

2. Pay to claim a prize

Fees for fictitious prizes, gifts, and lottery winnings

3. Computer Phishing

Deceptive email seeking your money or personal information

Prevention Strategies

- Don't make a decision while in a heightened emotional state.
- Don't share personal information

- Freeze your credit at each credit bureau




Staying Safe on the Internet
